Enrolling in an Advanced Placement (AP) course involves learning course content on a college level. AP courses have higher expectations in terms of understanding vocabulary, studying concepts, completing assignments, and reading course material. It is important for students to take into account the expectations for each course as listed below when choosing courses for the next school year. Students should also consider other courses in which they are enrolling and their extracurricular activities. \*Reminder: *Advanced Placement coursework is exempt from APS homework guidelines of 30 minutes outside of class per class, so that students can access the full curriculum of the college level courses.*
